The Importance of Record Keeping

Let's be real, no one likes record keeping. Sitting down and writing or typing lots of stuff that's hard to remember is not always fun, but it can be very helpful later on. It may not seem like a big deal now, but having accurate records of your time in 4-H can be very beneficial later down the road.

These Project Report Forms are your chance to show off what you've accomplished this year and what you've learned. We want to see what goals you had, the struggles and successes you had along the way. Ultimately we see your projects at the 4-H Fair, but just seeing a project doesn't tell the whole story. 4-H is not just about making projects, its about learning and growing. This is the way we get to see the awesome strides you make every year. It is also a great way to recognize and reward 4-Her's for things that would never make a 4-H Fair project.

Beyond short term recognition there is the opportunity to refine and go onto regional record book judging. If your book is selected from the regional judging, it competes at the state level. Those who win at the state level are publicly recognized and get to have their work displayed in front of all of Kansas 4-H.

Not only is the recognition nice, but Project Report Forms are helpful when you reach high school, college, and the career field. When you go to fill out scholarship applications they often ask about your involvement in programs growing up and throughout your school years. Having records of all you did and accomplished in 4-H is very helpful when filling out these applications. Even if 4-Her's do not attend a post secondary education program, having the records to fill out other applications is very useful. So although it might seem tough now, making the extra effort with Project Report Forms will pay off in the long run.

Side Notes

I can personally attest to how important record keeping is. When I went to apply for scholarships it was incredibly helpful having my Project Report Forms to go back and look at. My peers struggled to remember what they did, but I had nice, neat, and organized information ready to go. Also when I went to build my resume in high school and again in college, all my Project Report Forms came in handy. It was hard to fill out my Project Report Forms as a 4-Her. But thankfully the forms have been simplified since I filled them out, and now they are very streamlined and reasonable to work on. So from personal experience I can say that they might seem hard now, but are very worthwhile to do.
