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

Why even submit a Project Report Form (PRF)? To most of us PRF's are just more paperwork to fill out. But they do have value and are worth while! These forms not only highlight all the behind the scenes accomplishments from your projects, they are also helping to set up 4-Her's for later success. Just like project work, the ability to set goals, communicate learning outcomes, and the simple ability to fill out paperwork is super important. Also for those 4-Her's who would like to go onto post secondary programs such as trade school, community college, or a 4-year university these are so valuable. Scholarships often require you to fill out what accomplishments you have and when you received them. How are you supposed to remember everything you did over the last few years? Sure you remember big awards, but no one can remember everything. So having PRF's that show your accomplishments and what you learned are super important!

What if 4-Her's don't plan to go to post secondary school? Well life revolves around remembering what we've done. Even if you aren't going to school you still need to be able to fill out loan papers and show you an accomplished and responsible person. And loans are just a single example.

So if you didn't fill out PRF's or think they are too scary to fill out, I'd encourage you to give them a try next year. We even have a "How To" video on the Extension YouTube channel on how to fill out PRF forms! Plus if all else fails, all of us in the Extension Office would be more than happy to help you. Junior Producer Days

The K-State Junior Producer Days Series is a set of workshops for Kansas youth focused on the four main livestock species. Two workshops are hosted every year for two different species. This year a Swine and a Goat Producer Day will be held in Manhattan. Swine Producer Day is on Saturday March 1st and Goat Producer Day is on March 22nd. Flyers for both events are attached on this page and have also been emailed out. You can also find the flyers on "Kansas State Youth Livestock Program" Facebook page. If you currently participate or would like to participate in either species, I would highly encourage you to attend. Each Producer Day has both large informational sessions and small hands on sessions.

Why Stick With 4-H?

with the start of the new 4-H year I thought I would touch on the topic of "why stick with 4-H?". There are so many options for how youth spend their time from video games, sports, school clubs, church groups, and more. So why would you choose 4-H over another event? Well most all of the afore mentioned groups are good things, any organization that positively benefits youth is a good thing. So why would you pick to be in 4-H over a sport? Well it boils down to life skills. Sports and other activities that promote teamwork and other concepts are great and can prove beneficial, but there's more to life skills than teamwork.

The world is ever changing and if we do not equip our youth with the proper skills they need, then it is much more difficult for them to succeed. 4-H is designed to help youth develop useful skills by participating in local clubs and by doing projects. These clubs and projects are designed to be fun while also promoting learning. Teamwork, public speaking, record keeping abilities, creativity, confidence, and work ethic are some of the life skills developed through 4-H.




Happy Hustlers
